

With respect to divine healing like it was taught 30 years ago . .

The best memories I have are from the time when week after week there was a clear, strong Word preached - healing every time, no exceptions.

Then tragedies began and there were messages about doubters, sinners, open doors, Job, etc.

Then more serious and prominent tragedies and then the down the drain spiral began.

As I see it right now. That clear uncompromised message is Bible, demonstrable and undeniable

. . . . BUT

there is some sort of severe lack in our anointing so that it does not work.

So believing for healings in serious cases cannot be done safely at this time.

=====

Are there any ministers out there still preaching divine healing in an uncompromised way?

Would you counsel someone at death's door with a child's diabetes to continue right up to and through that door?

I agree with Ron's earlier response on this but since you've narrowed your comments to focus on how we council others a few thoughts come to mind. But first let me say that it seems contradictory for you to say that the bible is authoritative and at the same time say that we can't safely rely on what it says. But setting that aside for now, I do think that we ought to be very careful in advocating a course of action for those who may not have faith in God. In those situations your argument about needing an anointing has merit.

We all know that the bible speaks about the gifts of healing. I believe that the gifts (1Cor12) are primarily for the good of others. If someone has the gifts of healing then by all means exercise those gifts and we'll all see the results and be edified as the body of Christ.

If, on the other hand, we are exercising faith in God for our healing (as opposed to having the gift) then (again--primarily) the results are going to be more personal in nature and not necessarily for the benefit of others. I'm saying (not very articulately!) that we should embrace God's promises and hold fast to them no matter what as they relate to our personal experience but unless we have some kind of anointing (like the gifts of healing) we should probably let others develop their own faith and figure out for themselves how to walk it out.

Exceptions? Sure. Your example expresses a dilemma... what if it is a child, or someone whose well-being has been entrusted to us? In that kind of situation I can only believe that God is not going to allow something to overwhelm us without giving us the tools to cope with the situation. Like someone once said, if you have faith to believe for the salvation of the whole town, go ahead, but for most of us our sphere of faith is going to be much closer to home.

That said --your note implies (although not explicitly) that medical science is the ultimate answer for those not having faith and/or the anointing... I don't believe that to be a valid assumption.

It is reality that some Bible promises do not happen for us !!

This is a dilemma and a wake up call for us.

We see this failing in areas where God has promised sign/wonder type actions (immediate manifestations) on His part

- they do not happen.

Examples:

I Cor 12 - gift of signs (miracles - KJV) promised but missing
Eph 4 - Apostles with signs are promised but they do not happen.

We have the impossible dilemma that the Word promises sign/wonders to the church but they do not happen

Contradictory? Absolutely. It should be impossible for the Word to promise things that do not come to pass !

A hypothetical young father with a diabetic child is going to believe for a sign/wonder type healing (immediate manifestation) within hours or the child dies? . . . when the church has gone decades without the promised signs/wonders.

I recommend not to do this.

The death's door healing is very similar to a sign/wonder because in both cases we need God to do an immediate manifestation of His power.

Let's admit we lack anointing, ability by faith, close walk with God, (or whatever it need be called) to see these type of immediate manifestations.

I say people should not attempt faith near death's door. . .

until I Cor12 and apostles begin to happen.

Until then we need to recognize that something is wrong and we are not strong enough with God to be anywhere near death's door believing for immediate manifestations.

I don't believe anyone needs an Apostle present in order to be healed, nor do I believe one has to be in a local assembly of believers where the gifts are present to be healed. I fully agree that the 'church' as is present in the world today lack the gifts and divine healing and every other God ordained functions such as the 5-fold ministry. But individual followers of Jesus Christ scattered throughout the world are believing for and receiving healings from God every day.

Faith isn't found through the intellect, faith comes by hearing/reading The Word of GOD and believing that He who makes these promises will bring them to pass. It's been said over and over, but simple, child-like taking God at His Word and holding on is the essence of faith. (James 1:1-8)

Are you saying => if we cannot safely go to death's door as I say here in this thread then can we safely go to 'starvation's door' at the time of the mark?

A very interesting question (I hope it was truly what you meant)

aside: This whole thought process happens because the signs/wonders are missing - something that is unbiblical and should be impossible for us to see happen.

So we are in uncharted waters - asking what is right to do when the proper, normal anointing is missing

ultimate bottom line is get the anointing to work and then see immediate manifestaions happen on time- no exceptions, every time.

I have made a distinction between misc prayer requests and those prayers that require an immediate manifestation. Healing right before death is an immediate situation.

Since signs/wonders are a form of God doing an immediate manifestation and they are missing I then warn to avoid prayers that need an immediate manifestation such as at death's door. . . .saying such immediate acts of God do not happen in our experience so we cannot safely attempt such prayers.

With respect to starving in the trib without the mark . . .

it would be weeks to die of starvation but it really is sort of an immediate manifestation that is needed.

believers would have no choice but to face starvation in the trib just the same as a hypothetical accident victim might have no choice but to face death's door after a car wreck.

Both (death's door healing/imminent starvation) cannot be done safely in the current state of the church (church is the people) in my opinion - because they require immediate action from God which does not reliably happen in our experience.

Both should be avoided if at all possible, given an option.

Not given the option then the believer can only do the best he can to survive while staying faithful.

how that is walked -> is up to each believer and the critics should keep quiet.

after thought ----

If one sees as I do that the promised, immediate manifestation things are missing... reason unknown, who to blame unknown

then . . .

possibly the brethren who experienced tragedies approx 30 years ago were not to blame that immediate, life saving manifestations did not occur.

Maybe there was a larger problem in play- that we lacked anointing to see immediate manifestations at all.

A larger problem that is still ignored and continues even to this day.

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It is an interesting topic... especially since this is the one area that has been and still is the rock of offense in our circles.

I've said elsewhere on here that the branding of medical science as occult was probably the watershed event in Faith Assembly's history. The idea was presented in OT Theology. From that point opting to trust in medical science ceased from being a mere 'lack of faith in God' to an active turning away from God and seeking help from Satan. Just as Saul sought help from the witch of Endor and paid dearly for it, those who sought help from other 'deities' were doing so at the peril of their own souls.

It was a game changer.

Not one of us has perfect faith (yet! <grin>) and there are times in our lives that we haven't fully trusted in God for our finances, our deliverance, or our health. Like the apostles who stayed on the boat as Peter walked on the water, we too have found ourselves arranging our lives so as to

avoid all contact with the unknown. But just as the apostles matured in their faith and eventually 'got it right' we too are maturing and learning to trust God in more profound ways.

More and more we learn that it is much better to 'trust in the Lord'.

We learn that a life that is dependent upon Him is not as scary a prospect as it once was and over time we even begin to enjoy this aspect of our walk with Him.

This is the way it works in most of the aspects of our lives. Our faith grows and deepens each and every day. Not only did the disciples of the NT learn to depend on God in this way but this was the pattern for the children of Israel as they begin their journey in the wilderness.

With that as background we can see that God expects for us to depend on Him and that He is displeased when we do not. (Just look at the trouble that befell those who continued to resist His provision in the wilderness.)

BUT... it became a completely different ball game when they begin to actively seek to appease other gods in their quest for deliverance. When they made for themselves idols and turned away from the living God (who, by the way, had been miraculously providing them with *all* they had needed) their fate was sealed. They had crossed the line from learning to trust in God and maturing in their faith to actively turning away from Him by seeking the gods of the people... this was the abomination.

Learning to walk by faith day by day and the joy that comes from that pursuit ceases when the alternative is damnation; one who chooses to turn to other 'gods' for protection and deliverance has nothing to look forward to, all hope ceases.

By choosing this route one rejects God's provision and can no longer count on His blessings. At this point it is no longer a process of learning to trust but it is active rebellion against God. It matters not whether one's faith has matured to the point of being able to jump out of the boat in the face of the wind and waves; at this point it is a matter of rejecting God and no one wants (or wanted) to do that. That was our situation and it is no surprise that many would rather die than contemplate apostasy. No Christian would choose that route even if it meant death.

This is why the topic is so important. It is one thing to turn at the last minute to your brother-in-law for the money you need to pay the rent instead of trusting that God will miraculously supply but it is altogether different to turn away from God as Saul did and seek our help/healing/deliverance from Satan which is what we do if all medical science is occult.

So is it merely a lack of faith or is it apostasy to seek medical help?

Not that I'm commending a lack of faith but surely those brothers and sisters who made up our

assembly can see the distinction I'm trying to make concerning this topic? In our circles this was not about faith or the lack thereof but about choosing God, or choosing Satan... at least that is what it became.

People with no faith for healing were choosing to die because of what the alternative meant.

Martyrs throughout history have done the same thing... maybe the circumstances were different but essentially it boiled down to either choosing God, or choosing Satan. They were willing to choose God even without His miraculous intervention and they will no doubt be rewarded extravagantly for their choice. I also believe those who have made that choice in our circles will be beneficiaries of the same reward even if this question is answered differently than we were taught... it is always better to trust in the Lord.

That said, I do think that this type of discussion is sorely needed if for no other reason than to clarify in our own minds the difference between a lack of faith and/or a lack of fidelity to God.

I hope the extent of the conversation doesn't degenerate into two camps-- those who 'hold fast' to the teaching verses those who do not--but hopefully it can be a fruitful discussion that will lead us into a solid understanding of why we believe what we believe which should help us to stand on the solid rock and give us wisdom in dealing with those who have no clue about any of this.

Paul taught us that there are those who are weak in the faith and there are those who are strong. Those with scruples, and those who are free. In either case we are admonished to recognize that each will stand or fall based upon their relationship to Him, and that He is able to make us all to stand!

How one answers the question may very well determine whether or not his conscience is violated. I know that some have never even considered that going to medical science might be occult but the fact remains that many did and were willing to pay the ultimate price for their beliefs. Rightly or wrongly they held fast to what they believed and I think that is to be commended, not derided.

Others believed that it was apostasy and when they succumbed to fear and turned to medical science for help their conscience condemned them. I'm sure there are many in this category who have not recovered even to this day... my prayer is that they will realize that it is the devil who condemns and that Jesus is the repairer of the conscience.

Let's not forget that there exists another group... a group that has never even considered that medical science might be idolatry. What should our message to them be?

Hopefully someone will have some good answers!

I believe that medicine in various forms, hormones (insulin) good food or junk food, herbs, drinks of all kinds, exercise, vitamins, stimulants from without as in sun, TV, or computer screens, and sanitation principles all cause simple chemical reactions within the body. 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Is it the drugs in 'medical' science that makes it occult (if indeed we conclude that it is) or the 'science'?

Science and Christianity always had a shaky alliance and even today you'll find that some Christians think that faith and science are in opposition to each other and have nothing in common (redundant, I know!). I'll agree that when science theorizes about things that are contrary to the plain teaching of scripture it ought to be opposed but in those cases 'scientific' facts are not really facts but merely theories arising from the unbelieving heart of man. True science should affirm (where it is capable) all that is true and since Jesus is perfect Truth anything that is contrary to His teaching (or His Word) is by definition -- not true.

Most of us here are not Amish. We enjoy the benefits of scientific discoveries without apology. (If you are Amish and are reading this you might need to re-consider whether or not you are faithful to the tenets of your religion.)

Furthermore, as active participants on these internet forums we cannot still hold to some of the

teachings of FA or we would have long ago discerned the reality that the internet is ten-times the sewer-line the television ever was. So it is not that we are incapable of separating the good from the bad... we do it all the time in this arena. (Not only in this arena... most of us don't even hold to the rigid rule we were taught concerning the original sewer-line -- that old television set.)

So what about the arena of medical science? Can we not examine it anew without being labeled as having forsaken the faith? Is there nothing redeemable in this field? How is it we can be so liberal in some areas but not in this area?

I don't mean in any way to discredit anything that we were taught that had as its basis the word of God. That never changes. But man's opinions do change and are in no way to be equated with infallible Scripture.

Truth is truth wherever it might be found. A dirty wound will almost always become infected unless it is thoroughly cleansed by soap (a wonderful chemical combination that, like deodorant, has become indispensable in almost all social situations!) or an antiseptic solution. (I suppose that there are natural soaps and deodorants that can be made from common ingredients that are totally natural -- like sand and water -- but who does this?<grin>)

A healthy diet is now the rule for those who want to remain healthy for the duration of a lifetime (another one of those ways that scientific discovery has been assimilated into our thinking) and we don't consider that a breach of faith even with the promise of healing so prominently taught in our circles.

I've been reading a lot about the subject of drugs this past week and while there is *much* to condemn, especially as it relates to ancient rites and mind-altering potential, some of the material I find hard to dismiss with a blanket statement as I've done in the past. I'm certainly not saying that faith in the atoning work of Jesus isn't the answer for Christians, it absolutely is, but I'm not at this point ready to say that *all* drugs fall into the occultic category. And if you've been reading this thread you know the importance I place upon the Christian's involvement with the occult -- a serious matter that can have eternal consequences.

If we do conclude that *all* drugs are to be placed in the realm of the occult we have more to be concerned about than we probably realize. We ingest all kinds of chemical concoctions everyday in the food we eat and the coffee we drink. I'm not sure we can escape this problem without serious thought being given to actually adopting more of an Amish lifestyle -- raising our own food and livestock. Even then we might have trouble because of our dependence upon drinking water and the air we breath -- both oftentimes containing trace amounts of chemical pollutions.

None of these things keep us from praying to the Lord for our daily bread and thanking Him for the abundant supply of all of our needs even as we chow down on the hormone injected sirloin steak, not to mention all of the other drugs given to livestock to prevent disease and whatnot.

Occult involvement, innocent or not, does not excuse us from its effects...(I've heard that somewhere before!)

Hopefully I haven't been too lighthearted in this thread because I would like to get across the absolute seriousness of the subject matter.

Occult or not? What could be more important than figuring this out? Some of our closest friends have given their lives because of this question, and the faith of others remain shipwrecked, all because of this.

Following are the concepts I would have posted in this forum 30 years ago back when I believed the med science = occult teaching.

Possibly this will trigger new ideas for people.

30 years ago I would have posted . . .

Med science is witchcraft for the following 2 reasons:

1)

Pharmakeia, the Greek word, means witchcraft, poisoning, the administering of drugs

Since the administering of drugs is so closely related to witchcraft - so much so that the Greek word was the same for both - therefore they are inseparable even unto this day.

Therefore drug administrators (doctors, nurses,) are practicing witchcraft and contact with them in their health-providing capacity is occult contact whether drugs are involved in a given situation or not - ie: going to an occult practitioner for health is occult even if drugs are not involved on a given day.

2)

The ministry gifts of our churches have taught the above concept or close to it.

These ministry gifts are the real deal a la Eph 4 and God has His hand on them to avoid serious error and possibly all error.

If the med science = occult contact teaching is error, since it is such an important doctrine, then God has failed to watch over us (the churches) doctrinally - a concept that is not even possible since we are a special end time move of God.

Questions and answers- from 30 years ago

Q:Can a word definition from a word 2000 years ago be used to link modern med science to witchcraft?

A (30 years ago):The word definition links the use of drugs to witchcraft. So med science relates because med science uses drugs today.

Follow up: But the connection of witchcraft and drugs - could that connection have been because ancient witches used drugs as poisons - and there be no connection to modern drugs?

Beneficial, modern chemical combinations (drugs) were unknown in the first century so word usage would not have made the distinction between drugs as poison and drugs as helpful- because the helpful usage did not yet exist.

So then the first century word 'Pharmakeia' links witchcraft to the first century drug usage (poisoning). But drug usage has been changed so much by modern science that the linkage no longer applies.

A (30 years ago):Your concept makes some sense - modern drugs are far from the poisons of the first century witches. But I fall back on the fact that our anointed ministers have taught it as I am saying it.

Q:Is a farmer who uses antibiotics on his cattle an occult practitioner?

A (30 years ago):Yes because he is using drugs instead of praying for God to take care of the animals.

The nature of sorcery:

- 1) They consult the dead (1Sam 28)
- 2) Practice magic (Ex 7:11)
- 3) Interpret dreams (Dan 2:2)
- 4) Use divination (Jer 27:9-10)

They often use drugs as a part of their ritual, sometimes taking them internally to heighten the experience (often sexual).

The usage of drugs has its source in witchcraft.

There is no place in the OT where it says drugs are to be avoided but the association is derived from the Septuagint translation of the term for sorcery with the Greek term for drugs--pharmakeia. Gal 5:20 uses the same term.

From the above teaching HEF says that it isn't just a lack of faith to turn to the doctors and their drugs but it is a lack of discernment as to the source of where you are getting your treatment. His conclusion: Anyone who seeks that sort of treatment needs to go through occult deliverance.

He goes on to say that medical science comes directly from witchcraft and they still use some of the same techniques.

"God didn't design our bodies for witchcraft potions and mutilation with a scalpel."

(The above notes were taken from the tape in OT Theology where this subject was covered.)

HEF defined occultism this way:

Stated concisely, it is participation or involvement in any way with fortunetelling, magic practices, spiritism, or false religious cults and teachings.

Etymology

Main article: Chemistry (etymology)

The word alchemy derives from the Old French alquimie, which is from the Medieval Latin alchimia, and which is in turn from the Arabic al-kimia (Ø§Ù„ÙƒÙŠÙ…ÙŠØ§Ø§). This term itself is derived from the Ancient Greek chemeia (ĤĥĤĥĤĥĤĥ) or chemia (ĤĥĤĥĤĥĤĥ) with the addition of the Arabic definite article al- (Ø§Ù„Ù€). The ancient Greek word may have been derived from a version of the Egyptian name for Egypt, which was itself based on the Ancient Egyptian word kÄ“me (hieroglyphic Khmi, black earth, as opposed to desert sand). The word could also have originally derived from chumeia (Ĥĥĥĥĥĥĥĥĥ) meaning "mixture" and referring to pharmaceutical chemistry. With the later rise of alchemy in Alexandria, the word may have derived from Ĥĥĥĥĥĥĥĥĥ, and thus became spelled as Ĥĥĥĥĥĥĥĥĥ, and the original meaning forgotten. The etymology is still open, and recent research indicates that the Egyptian derivation may be valid.

History

Alchemy covers several philosophical traditions spanning some four millennia and three continents. These traditions' general penchant for cryptic and symbolic language makes it hard to trace their mutual influences and "genetic" relationships. One can distinguish at least three major strands, which appear to be largely independent, at least in their earlier stages: Chinese alchemy, centered in China and its zone of cultural influence; Indian alchemy, centered around the Indian subcontinent; and Western alchemy, which occurred around the Mediterranean and whose center has shifted over the millennia from Greco-Roman Egypt, to the Islamic world, and finally medieval Europe. Chinese alchemy was closely connected to Taoism and Indian alchemy with the Dharmic faiths, whereas Western alchemy developed its own philosophical system that was largely independent of, but influenced by, various Western religions. It is still an open question whether these three strands share a common origin, or to what extent they influenced each other.

Alchemy is an ancient tradition, the primary objective of which was the creation of the mythical "philosopher's stone," which was said to be capable of turning base metals into gold or silver, and also act as an elixir of life that would confer youth and immortality upon its user. Alchemy can be viewed as a protoscience, a precursor to modern chemistry, having provided procedures, equipment, and terminology that are still in use. However, alchemy also included various non-scientific mythological, religious, and spiritual concepts, theories and practices.

Modern discussions of alchemy are generally split into an examination of its exoteric practical applications, and its esoteric aspects. The former is pursued by historians of the physical sciences who have examined the subject in terms of proto-chemistry, medicine, and charlatanism. The latter is of interest to the historians of esotericism, psychologists, spiritual and new age communities, and hermetic philosophers. The subject has also made an ongoing impact on literature and the arts. Despite the modern split, numerous sources stress an integration of esoteric and exoteric approaches to alchemy. Holmyard, when writing on exoteric aspects, states that they can not be properly appreciated if the esoteric is not always kept in mind. The prototype for this model can be found in Bolos of Mendes' second century BCE work, *Physika kai Mystika* (On Physical and Mystical Matters). Marie-Louise von Franz tells us the double approach of Western alchemy was set from the start, when Greek philosophy was mixed with Egyptian and Mesopotamian technology. The technological, operative approach, which she calls extraverted, and the mystic, contemplative, psychological one, which she calls introverted are not mutually exclusive, but complementary instead, as meditation requires practice in the real world, and conversely.

Esoteric hermetic alchemists may reject work on exoteric substances, instead directing their search for the philosopher's stone inward. Though esoteric and exoteric approaches are sometimes mixed, it is clear that some authors "are not concerned with material substances but are employing the language of exoteric alchemy for the sole purpose of expressing theological, philosophical, or mystical beliefs and aspirations." New interpretations continue to be developed around spagyric, chemical, and esoteric schools of thought.

During the 17th century, practical alchemy started to evolve into modern chemistry, as it was renamed by Robert Boyle, the "father of modern chemistry". In his book, *The Skeptical Chymist*, Boyle attacked Paracelsus and the natural philosophy of Aristotle, which was taught at universities. However, Boyle's biographers, in their emphasis that he laid the foundations of modern chemistry, neglect how steadily he clung to the Scholastic sciences and to Alchemy, in theory, practice and doctrine. The decline of alchemy continued in the 18th century with the birth of modern chemistry, which provided a more precise and reliable framework within a new view of the universe based on rational materialism.

During the renaissance, alchemy broke into more distinct schools placing spiritual alchemists in high contrast with those working with literal metals and chemicals. While most spiritual alchemists also incorporate elements of exotericism, examples of a purely spiritual alchemy can be traced back as far as the sixteenth century, when Jacob Boehme used alchemical terminology in strictly mystical writings. Another example can be found in the work of Heinrich Khunrath (1560–1605) who viewed the process of transmutation as occurring within the alchemist's soul.

The recent work of Principe and Newman, seeks to reject the 'spiritual interpretation' of alchemy, stating it arose as a product of the Victorian occult revival. There is evidence to support that some classical alchemical sources were adulterated during this time to give greater weight to the spiritual aspects of alchemy. Despite this, other scholars such as Calian and Tilton reject this view as entirely historically inaccurate, drawing examples of historical spiritual alchemy from Boehme, Isaac Newton, and Michael Maier.

Science and the occult

To the occultist, occultism is conceived of as the study of the inner nature of things, as opposed to

the outer characteristics that are studied by science. The German philosopher Arthur Schopenhauer designates this "inner nature" with the term Will, and suggests that science and mathematics are unable to penetrate beyond the relationship between one thing and another in order to explain the "inner nature" of the thing itself, independent of any external causal relationships with other "things".[16][original research?] Schopenhauer also points towards this inherently relativistic nature of mathematics and conventional science in his formulation of the 'World as Will'. By defining a thing solely in terms of its external relationships or effects we only find its external, or explicit nature. Occultism, on the other hand, is concerned with the nature of the "thing-in-itself". This is often accomplished through direct perceptual awareness, known as mysticism. From the scientific perspective, occultism is regarded as unscientific as it does not make use of the scientific method (that is, observation and experimentation) to obtain facts.

The New Age Movement and the Biblical Worldview [I can get reference information if you insist]

"For most of human history, the diagnosis and treatment of bodily malfunctions have belonged to the realm of the supernatural. Indeed, if a history of the world's medicine were to give equal time to each century of the last five thousand years, most of it would be a Who's Who of mystics, faith healers, gurus, and shamans (the medicine man/priest of primitive societies). Only in the recent past has the study of the human body been separated somewhat from a supernatural overlay".

From the above information (which is just a touch of what is out there!) there seems to be a consensus that there are two distinct streams in both alchemy and medical science. One stream is clearly occult in nature and the other would fall into the scientific category. We can ignore this distinction but consistency demands an explanation of why one branch (alchemy/chemistry) is acceptable for the Christian and not the other given the close similarities and even direct overlapping of the two fields.

In many cases the distinction is not very hard to discern like homeopathy and other mystical new-age methodologies that co-exist with the more modern counter-parts.

Western medical science is predominately concerned with the purely physical aspects of the human body and seeks to fix the problems that arise not by seeking the root cause of the problems (which more often than not have a spiritual cause and not merely a physical one) but by patching up the body with things/drugs that are known to relieve the suffering of its patients. Now one can argue about whether or not this is the proper methodology but it does remove much of the mystic aspects of medical science that would place it clearly into the occult realm.

It is interesting that the approaches that attempt to deal with the 'whole man' (holistic, new-age, etc.) are those that are still actively involved in the ancient roots of occultism.

Praise Jesus for His provision. He came to heal/save the whole man!

Hi Jman,

I don't have a lot of time to get into the rest of your summary most of which I agree with but I did want to examine the above quote because I think that a fundamental misunderstanding here will color/taint the proper relationship that teachers have with the Church.

As far as I know this teaching was not, nor was ever purported to be, 'a revelation'.

First of all this 'revelation' as you call it was not unique to Hobart Freeman. There are and have been many people/teachers in history that have held to similar views. Greek lexicons have been around a long time and it doesn't take a genius to yoke pharmacology with the Septuagint's translation of the OT term for sorcery as pharmakia.

This, in and of itself, takes it from the realm of 'revelation' and places it squarely into the realm from which most teachers operate -- Biblical studies, words and their meanings, interpretation of facts, etc..

If this teaching were in the realm of 'revelation' then we would have no other option than to say that it was a 'revelation' from a source other than God -- assuming that the modern-day application of HEF's teaching is in error, of course, and also assuming that our conclusions are right. I don't claim that my conclusion is in any way 'a revelation' so why should we assume that HEF's conclusion was a revelation? Did he claim that?

I don't know who will be saved and who won't, but I know that if God said something it is truth and I am responsible to walk in it.

If we don't want to believe God will heal us every time then we can get into the "if it be thy will" deception. God has been too faithful to me all these years to not believe Him. I

remember a song we use to sing: "I have decided to follow Jesus." One verse we use to sing with that is: "Though none go with me, yet I will follow." Do we still believe that? It is so hard to see old friends and where they are now. I saw someone yesterday who use to go to church with me and it made my heart sad.

I remember one time when I was driving to Faith Assembly early one Sunday morning after there had been a split in our assembly, and the Lord spoke to me as clear as I have ever had and said: "You haven't seen anything yet. You need to pray for acute discernment for what is ahead."

We need to be aware of the wiles of the devil in his subtle deceptions.

The following statement was posted and I would like to disagree with the statement:

"I want to mention that I look back and do not agree with all that was taught at FA or how Dr. Freeman chose to act out his faith at times.

Yes, not having faith for healing is just as dangerous as not having faith in God's provision if one finds themselves in the midst of tribulation, both can result in death. We know that there will be a large number of martyrs that come out of tribulation (that fact is stated in the book of Revelation and implied by the quote "they overcame him by the blood of the lamb and loved not their lives unto death") with this in mind one has less reason to think that death won't be the ultimate price one may need to pay in the tribulation. It is a fact that in our circles people have paid the ultimate price, which has formed the direction of this thread and given rise to all of the discussion concerning this topic.

What we are considering is not whether Christians are willing to die for their faith -- they are, they have, and they will -- the question is: did they die for the wrong reasons? Did they die because of a doctrine that may not have biblical support? I'm not taking away from the nobility of dying for what you believe, many did and I have nothing but the greatest respect for those individuals.

Those that survived the death of their loved ones have found their faith shaken to the core and many have given up because of what happened. Many of the kids from such situations remain in a state of confusion to this day because of this.

Many others gave up because their conscience wouldn't let them continue this walk of faith knowing that they had sought help from a source that they believe to be satanic in nature. Their faith is shipwrecked.

Anyone who suggests that the subject now under consideration is somehow unimportant or not worthy of our attention is severely limited in their capacity for compassion for those groups I

mentioned. This lack of compassion isn't unusual however, we are known for it.

I prefer to call it prodding, but your admonishment is acknowledged and I'll try to do better in implementing it in the future.

My purpose in 'prodding' for answers has produced some good though at least as far as my own views are concerned.

1) For years I've questioned the *ALL* medical science and *ALL* drugs equals occult involvement, but I never could put my finger on the reasons why. It didn't affect my position on divine healing because I've burned all bridges to the arm of the flesh and have completely committed myself to the sovereignty of God in this area (I hope you understand what I mean here.)

Because of the teaching at FA I had always equated that route with turning away from God -- to Satan, and believed with all of my heart that taking that road would be apostasy. I don't think that this view was unique to me. In fact I know it wasn't unique to me. It was a mind-set that permeated those in our circles. Maybe you and Sage (and others) weren't afflicted, but I know that many had that same attitude. If you've noticed my passion for this issue has been a result of my concern for those who were similarly affected.

So while this thread wasn't the first time I had considered this issue it has greatly clarified a lot of

loose ends for me. (Pardon me for personalizing this so much, but I want you to see that my earlier notes were not just attempts to get others to doubt their positions but to get this fully hashed out in my own mind.)

2) This is related to the above but it is different in that it is a separate issue and that is whether or not the chemical substances themselves are evil. I'm seeing that this isn't a true perception. Substances are not evil in and of themselves (I do believe that demons can attach themselves in some sort of way, that I'm not prepared to explain, to inanimate objects -- like an Ouija board or a figurine for instance -- but the wood itself isn't by nature evil or we'd have to make a decision concerning living in a house built of the stuff.)

I'm very happy for the discussion because I believe that with a better understanding about these things my faith is actually more settled than ever. No one should want to stick with the status-quo if our foundational thinking is wrong.

3) Which brings up a completely separate issue concerning the relationship of faith to sound reasoning. The capacity to think/reason isn't a bad thing. The ability to reason/think is an attribute that God has given to us as human beings and this ability coupled with a renewed mind is one of the greatest assets that we have as humans.

Carnal reasoning without a renewed mind might be in opposition to faith but those who 'understand' who God is are much more likely to have a strong faith than those who adopt a few principles of faith and expect good results. Faith doesn't work that way. Faith *IS* knowledge. It's just knowledge based upon our understanding of the immutable attributes of God and because of this it transcends our physical senses.

Reason even has its place in the carnal unbeliever. Thank God for that! But redeemed reason, that is something we all should aspire toward.

With all of the above in mind, please reconsider your participation. Even if you have everything settled in your heart you can certainly contribute to the understanding of others. I know that I have been influenced by all of you and hope that this kind of interaction can continue. I'll do my best to gently 'prod' instead of resorting to jabs!

The Caduceus vs the Staff of Asclepius (Asklepian 03) Keith Blayney Sept 2002, revised Oct 2005

Asclepius dealt with patients - merchants make deals with clients
Asclepius is linked with a constellation of idealistic medical ideas
Hermes is linked with hermetic occultism
Mercury is identified with mercantile mercenary views

[1] The Caduceus of Mercury (Roman) and the Karykeion of Hermes (Greek)

Many "medical" organisations use a symbol of a short rod entwined by two snakes and topped by a pair of wings, which is actually the caduceus or magic wand of the Greek god Hermes (Roman Mercury), messenger of the gods, inventor of (magical) incantations, conductor of the dead and protector of merchants and thieves. It is derived from the Greek karykeion = "herald's staff", itself based on the word "eruko" meaning restrain, control.

It is interesting to see that most of organisations using this symbol are generally either commercial or military (or American). New Zealand examples include drug and pharmaceutical companies. A study by Friedlander confirms this impression.

The link between the caduceus of Hermes (Mercury) and medicine seems to have arisen by the seventh century A.D., when Hermes had come to be linked with alchemy. Alchemists were referred to as the sons of Hermes, as Hermetists or Hermeticists and as "practitioners of the hermetic arts". There are clear occult associations with the caduceus.

The caduceus was the magic staff of Hermes (Mercury), the god of commerce, eloquence, invention, travel and theft, and so was a symbol of heralds and commerce, not medicine. The words caduity & caducous imply temporality, perishableness and senility, while the medical profession espouses renewal, vitality and health.

[2] The Staff of Asclepius (Æsclepius, Asklepios) [Personification of Medical or healing Art and its ideals]

Professional and patient centred organisations (such as the NZMA, in fact most medical Associations around the world including the World Health Organization) use the "correct" and traditional symbol of medicine, the staff of Asclepius with a single serpent encircling a staff, classically a rough-hewn knotty tree limb. Asclepius (an ancient greek physician deified as the god

of medicine) is traditionally depicted as a bearded man wearing a robe that leaves his chest uncovered and holding a staff with his sacred single serpent coiled around it, (example right) symbolizing renewal of youth as the serpent casts off its skin. The single serpent staff also appears on a Sumerian vase of c. 2000 B.C. representing the healing god Ningishita, the prototype of the Greek Asklepios. However, there is a more practical origin postulated which makes sense [See *Dracunculus medinensis*].

Asclepius and his staff

Who was Asclepius? Asclepius was most probably a skilled physician who practised in Greece around 1200BC (and described in Homer's *Iliad*). Eventually through myth and legend he came to be worshipped as Asclepius, the (Greek) god of Healing. [See BBC reference]

Medical schools developed, which were usually connected to temples or shrines called Asclepiions (Asclepieia) dedicated to Asclepius. The Asclepion became very important in Greek society. Patients believed they could be cured by sleeping in them. They would visit, offering gifts and sacrifices to the god, and be treated by priest healers (called the Asclepiadae). The worship of Asclepius spread to Rome and continued as late as the sixth century.

The Asclepiadae were a large order of priest physicians who controlled the sacred secrets of healing, which were passed from father to son. Harmless Aesculapian snakes were kept in the combination hospital-temples built by the ancient Greeks and, later, by the Romans in honor of the god. The snakes are found not only in their original range of southern Europe, but also in the various places in Germany and Austria where Roman temples had been established. Escaped snakes survived and flourished.

Smooth, glossy, and slender, the snake has a uniformly brown back with a streak of darker color behind the eyes. The snake's belly is yellowish or whitish and has ridged scales that catch easily on rough surfaces, making it especially adapted for climbing trees. Scientific classification: The Aesculapian snake belongs to the family Colubridae. It is classified as *Elaphe longissima*.

The Myth: Asclepius is the god of Healing. He is the son of Apollo and the nymph, Coronis. While pregnant with Asclepius, Coronis secretly took a second, mortal lover. When Apollo found out, he sent Artemis to kill her. While burning on the funeral pyre, Apollo felt pity and rescued the unborn child from the corpse. Asclepius was taught about medicine and healing by the wise centaur, Cheiron, and became so skilled in it that he succeeded in bringing one of his patients back from the dead. Zeus felt that the immortality of the Gods was threatened and killed the healer with a thunderbolt. At Apollo's request, Asclepius was placed among the stars as Ophiuchus, the serpent-bearer.

Meditrine, Hygeia and Panacea: The children of Asclepius included his daughters Meditrina, Hygeia and Panacea who were symbols of medicine, hygiene and healing (literally, "all healing") respectively. Two of the sons of Asclepius appeared in Homer's Illiad as physicians in the Greek army (Machaon and Podalirius).

Note that the classic Hippocratice Oath is sworn "by Apollo the physician, by Æsculapius, Hygeia, and Panacea,"

The probable medical origin of the single serpent around a rod: In ancient times infection by parasitic worms was common. The filarial worm *Dracunculus medinensis* aka "the fiery serpent", aka "the dragon of Medina" aka "the guinea worm" crawled around the victim's body, just under the skin. Physicians treated this infection by cutting a slit in the patient's skin, just in front of the worm's path. As the worm crawled out the cut, the physician carefully wound the pest around a stick until the entire animal had been removed. It is believed that because this type of infection was so common, physicians advertised their services by displaying a sign with the worm on a stick. [See graphic photos -not for the faint-hearted or Benjamin.]

The staff as a Medical symbol: From the early 16th century onwards, the staff of Asclepius and the caduceus of Hermes were widely used as printers'™ marks especially as frontispieces to pharmacopoeias in the 17th and 18th centuries. Over time the rod and serpent (the Asclepian staff) emerged as an independent symbol of medicine.

Despite the unequivocal claim of the staff of Asclepius to represent medicine (and healing), the caduceus, a rod with two entwined serpents topped by a pair of wings appears to be the more popular symbol of medicine in the United States, probably due to simple confusion between the caduceus and the staff of Asclepius, the true symbol of medicine. Many people use the word caduceus to mean both of these emblems.

The Greek Hermes found his analogue in Egypt as the ancient Wisdom god Thoth, as Taaut of the Phoenicians and in Rome as the god Mercury (all linked with a magic rod with twin snakes).

The mythical origin of his magic twin serpent caduceus is described in the story of Tiresias. Poulenc, in "Les Mamelles de Tiresias" (The Breasts of Tiresias) tells how Tiresias--the seer who was so unhelpful to Oepidus and Family- found two snakes copulating, and to separate them stuck his staff between them. Immediately he was turned into a woman, and remained so for seven years, until he was able to repeat his action, and change back to male. The transformative power in this story, strong enough to completely reverse even physical polarities of male and female, comes from the union of the two serpents, passed on by the wand. Tiresias' staff, complete with serpents, was later passed on to Hermes...

Occult Hermetic Connection: An occult description of the Caduceus of Hermes (Mercury) is that the serpents may represent positive and negative kundalini as it moves through the chakras and around the spine (the staff) to the head where it communicates with MIND by intellection, the domain of Mercury [wings].

Caduceus Power Wand: This wand is sold at occult, new age & witchcraft stores such as Abaxion with descriptions such as "It's central phallic rod represents the potentiality of the masculine, and is intimately surrounded by the writhing, woven shakti energies of two coupling serpents. The rod also represents the spine [sushumna] while the serpents conduct spiritual currents [pranas] along the ida and pingala channels in a double helix pattern from the chakra at the base of the spine up to the pineal gland".

According to occultists, there are three principal nadis (Sanskrit for channel) in the human body. The sushumna (the spinal column through which the life-forces flow), by which means we enter and leave the body, the Ida (refreshment and stimulation of spirit), which is associated with the higher mind or manas and the Pingala, (reddish-brown), associated with kama or the force of desire. (G. de Purucker "Man in Evolution" ch. 15 & 16; and "Fountain-Source of Occultism", pp. 458-63).

Hermetic: There are few names to which more diverse persons and disciplines lay claim than the term "Hermetic". Alchemists have applied the adjective "Hermetic" to their art, while magicians (not the entertaining type) attach the name to their ceremonies of evocation and invocation. Followers of Meister Eckhart, Raymond Lull, Paracelsus, Jacob Boehme, and most recently Valentin Tomberg are joined by academic scholars of esoterica, all of whom attach the word "Hermetic" to their activities.

The most abiding impact of Hermeticism on Western culture came about by way of the heterodox mystical, or occult, tradition. Renaissance occultism, with its alchemy, astrology, ceremonial magic, and occult medicine, became saturated with the teachings of the Hermetic books. This content has remained a permanent part of the occult transmissions of the West, and, along with Gnosticism and Neoplatonism, represents the foundation of all the major Western occult currents. Hermetic elements are demonstrably present in the Rosicrucian and Theosophical movements.

The caduceus in pseudo-science: There are amazing claims that a Cadeuceus Power Wand has zero impedance and infinite resonance! -check it out here .

The caduceus as a Medical symbol: The link between Hermes and his caduceus and medicine seems to have arisen by Hermes links with alchemy. Alchemists were referred to as the sons of Hermes, as Hermetists or Hermeticists and as "practitioners of the hermetic arts". By the end of the sixteenth century, the study of alchemy included not only medicine and pharmaceuticals but chemistry, mining and metallurgy. Despite learned opinion that it is the single snake staff of Asclepius that is the proper symbol of medicine, many medical groups have adopted the twin serpent caduceus of Hermes or Mercury as a medical symbol during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries.

Like the staff of Asclepius, the caduceus became associated with medicine through its use as a printer's mark, as printers saw themselves as messengers of the printed word and diffusers of knowledge (hence the choice of the symbol of the messenger of the ancient gods). A major reason for the current popularity of the caduceus as a medical symbol was its illinformed [03] official adoption as the insignia for the Medical Department of the United States Army in 1902.

Friedlander surveyed 242 logos or insignias of American organizations relating to health or

medicine in which the caduceus or staff of Asclepius formed an integral part dating from the late 1970s to early 1980s. He found that professional associations were more likely to use the staff of Asclepius (62%) while commercial organizations were more likely to use the caduceus (76%). The exception is for hospitals, where only 37% used a staff of Asclepius versus 63% for the caduceus [but remember that US hospitals are usually commercial ventures]. Friedlander notes that while the prevalent use of the caduceus for the commercial aspects of medicine might be seen as "more-or-less appropriate", he thinks the reason is that professional associations are more likely to have a real understanding of the two symbols, whereas commercial organizations are more likely to be concerned with the visual impact a symbol will have in selling their products. And the Lord said unto Moses, Make thee a fiery serpent, and set it upon a pole: and it shall come to pass, that every one that is bitten [by a sepent], when he looketh upon it, shall live. Numbers 21:8. The etching "The Brazen Serpent" (to the right) by Schnorr von Carolsfeld shows this as only one snake, suggesting he interpreted this as a medical rather than mystical or magical symbol.

Apparently an Israelite cult subsequently formed worshipping Nehush'tan, the serpent Moses made (apparently twin snake images were inscribed on standards of the time) but the cult was eventually suppressed (over 600 years later) by King Hezekiah - "He removed the high places, and brake the images, and cut down the groves, and brake in pieces the brasen serpent that Moses had made: for unto those days the children of Israel did burn incense to it: and he called it Nehushtan (2 Kings 18:4).

Physicians treated this infection by cutting a slit in the patient's skin, just in front of the worm's path. As the worm crawled out the cut, the physician carefully wound the pest around a stick until the entire animal had been removed. It is believed that because this type of infection was so common, physicians advertised their services by displaying a sign with the worm on a stick.
