I wrote this earlier... about the email clients... since you use gmail you might find it interesting:

If you like 'old-school' stuff, you've got to try out Alpine (formerly Pine). It is really the best client for power users.

I've got ten or eleven email addresses that must be monitored and Alpine does it better than anything else I've found. It is a text-based program (so much for the pretty and nice!) that allows you quickly do almost anything that needs to be done via email. (They even have a MAC version Hombre!)

All of my email addresses are set up using IMAP (but it will work with POP as well), which allows me to constantly be 'logged in' to the mail box and receive instant notifications about incoming mail. I've spent the last few days converting my POP accounts to IMAP which seems to be the best thing going.

If you use Gmail you can actually set it up to gather up to five accounts and then use Alpine to access Gmail without going to the trouble of converting the accounts individually. Imagine being able to instantly get all of your email without ever logging into Gmail! No mouse clicks, no hindrances, just fast keystroke commands that keep you productive.

Alpine works great from the start right out of the box, but if you are a power-user, it has some awesome features!

I've been away from MS Outlook for some time now (because of the constant stream of hacker-attacks) and used Opera as both a web browser and email client, but now, with the new PC Alpine, I don't see myself ever going back! I quit using Pine (Alpine's predecessor) a few years back but I wish I had never left.

Quote: The Pool of Bethesda has been an area of controversy for Christian historians and archaeologists alike. According to the Gospel of John, Bethesda was a swimming bath (Greek: Ἰσραηλῆς ἄβαθ... ἄβαθ, kolumbethra) with five porticos (translated as porches by older English Bible translations).

Here's their conclusion:

Quote: This archaeological discovery proved beyond a doubt that the description of this pool in the Gospel of John was not the creation of the Evangelist. It reflected an accurate and detailed knowledge of the site. The Gospel speaks of (a) the name of the pool as Bethesda; (b) its location near the Sheep Gate; (c) the fact that it has five porticos; with rushing water. All these details are corroborated through literary and archaeological evidence affirming the historical accuracy of the Johannine account.

I do think its interesting that it is mentioned in scripture. Presently its in the muslim quarter of the Old City in Jerusalem (The pool), remember the city is divided up into four quarters, I think one is Jewish, one Muslim, one Christian, and I don't remember who is in the last quarter or section of this city. We went all through the Old City when my wife and I went to Jerusalem. I wished I would of paid attention more at the time but it was all new to us. If I ever go back to Israel I am going to look at the Bible and see what it says about every area I am at. The professor who led our group

would constantly remind us to look around remember where your at this is where Jesus walked and lived. There was so much going on at the time, trying to take it all in was a task.

Visitors can go into any quarter as there are a lot of gift shops with hand made goods, food, etc.

The pool of Bethesda is a now empty fairly deep hole with stone walls on the sides. I also read what you stated about some manuscripts leave out that portion of scripture. I think the KJV includes those scriptures.

I don't know if you read the "Out of Zion" series by Bodie Thoene, but she did a lot of research and incorporated a lot of history of the old city in Jerusalem in those fiction books. I did enjoy her books once you start them you want to read all night.

Hey I might go over and reread that world government post by Marilyn, I'm not entirely convinced on this Assyrian world leader. I want to look at the scriptures she gave on this.

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I haven't ever used an ipad so I can't comment on whether or not it would be better than a kindle but from what I've heard the kindle is better if you are just going to be reading books.

Most of the family have kindle fires which allow you to do things on the internet (like post here, read email, etc.). The kindle fires have a bright colorful screen and are essentially small tablet internet notebooks. The're good for reading and surfing the internet.

However, what I have is an older kindle 3g model. It has a built in keyboard and you can go on the internet in a pinch (read email, surf, etc.) but it really isn't a great tool for that. It is great at one thing though, and that is reading books. It doesn't have a bright screen (it is black and white, just like paper) and at night you will need an external light (just like a book).

There are literally thousands of free books for the kindle and you can also buy almost anything from Amazon (although not all books have been converted to kindle as of yet!).

I have a program called Calibre that keeps track of all my books, not just the ones from Amazon, but all of the pdf-books that I've downloaded.

My kindle 3g will last approximately 40 hours on a charge if I'm using it... it doesn't use any of its battery power when not in use. (The kindle fires won't last nearly as long).

The 3g model that I have also has wifi that I can use when I'm in range of a wifi signal but the 3g kicks in when there is no signal to be found. If you have an Amazon account all of the books you have there can be transfered to your kindle (and still be available to be read via your pc).

Hope this inspires you to get one, you'll love it!
