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I've always been amazed by the wisdom God gave one man, Solomon, and how he passed that on to others. Many places he addresses younger men by saying "my son", then instructing them in the ways of wisdom. In I Kings 3, Solomon asked God for an understanding heart to judge the children of Israel and to discern between good and bad; verse 9. And because Solomon didn't ask for riches or a long life, God blessed him with both wisdom and riches and a long life. verse 12 "Behold, I have done according to thy words: lo, I have given thee a wise and an understanding heart; so that there was none like thee before thee, neither after thee shall any arise like unto thee.

And I have also given thee that which thou hast not asked, both riches, and honour: so that there shall not be any among the kings like unto thee all thy days."

The answers to almost all, if not all, ethical and practical day to day decisions we face today can be found in Proverbs. Plus instruction on how to keep our attitude right before God. Such a wealth of learning, from simple statements that draw a parallel between watching how ants prepare for winter, and the wisdom of people doing the same thing. How about the wise observation that a merry heart doeth good like a medicine? What about the joy that comes when we finally receive something that has been deferred, he describes it as 'a tree of life' in chapter 13 verse 12. How about the warning against the cunning ways of 'the strange woman' in chapters 5,6,7.

This has been my prayer for many years, to walk in the wisdom and understanding of not only Proverbs, but the entire Word of God. I don't think it came to Solomon overnight, but that The Lord revealed it to him as was needed. He says over in Ecclesiastes chapter 1 verse 17 that he gave his heart to know wisdom and knowledge, but he also said that with much wisdom and knowledge come much grief and sorrow, verse 18.

But we're so blessed, in that what it took him a lifetime to experience and learn, we have made available to us now. But there's a huge difference between reading something, regardless of how wise it is, and learning to apply it to everyday situations. It's like learning to live by faith, there's head faith when we first read about or learn something God is teaching us about faith; then there's faith in our hearts when we KNOW by living and walking in it and seeing the manifestations. But God is faithful, if we'll be faithful to hunger and thirst and seek His wisdom with our whole hearts.

Really sometimes when I think about how dumb something some kid is doing, saying, or acting like; I just get a fresh appreciation for who God is and His power to transform a person.

And speaking of wisdom, when I was a young man, I was indestructible and I knew EVERYTHING; as I grew up in The Lord and got a few years on me, I became aware of just how DEPENDENT I was on Him, and that I knew practically NOTHING. But now when The Holy Spirit gives me wisdom in an area, I feel so humbled, knowing how arrogant and foolish I was without Him. What a mighty God we serve!

May The Lord help us see the value and importance of getting His Word in our hearts, and give us an insatiable hunger for Wisdom.

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Proverbs has got to be my favourite book in the bible. I took a serious look at it years back when the Lord really started dealing with me about my life. He knocked right off my feet (figuratively) and put me in a place where my attention was completely on him. I started spending serious time studying this book.

Probably my favourite vs in the bible is Prov.1/23. Whoso hearkens unto me shall dwell safely and be quiet from the fear of evil.
It just speaks so directly to the heart.

I found that rather than a book filled with bits and pcs and odds and sods that there were a number of themes that ran through the book. I'm going to list a few with my comments.

1. Wisdom “ just a constant admonition to get it use it live it pay attention to it as its given here. Its contrasted with foolishness in the companion book of Ecclesiastes (where the whole book deals with wisdom). AS Solomon began to study wisdom he saw . . .
“Then I saw that wisdom excelleth folly as light excelleth darkness.”
It gives the benefits of getting it & the results in ones life & the characteristics of a man who has it etc.

2. Righteousness “ the benefits of it & the results both individual and national

3. Health “ how to be healthy. Lots here. One is eat honey! Its good for you. But not too much or you will get sick. Another one is 13/12

Desire realized is a tree of life

If you genuinely desire something you need to ask the Lord for it. Seeing it come to pass has a huge healthy beneficial affect on our life.

4. The sluggard or lazy man. Solomon had no use for him. In Chronicles he saw a man who was diligent and made him a chief overseer.

5. Wickedness - characteristics and the results. Both individual and national.

6. Dealing with the mouth. Causes & effects & results. Big problem for most people. According to James -I mean the one in the NT - even the most spiritual people need to keep a handle on it.

7. Fools - the book is filled with discussion about this. Characteristics especially. In one place he says if you see a fool coming just go the other way. If anyone here thinks they're getting to the point where they're ready for the rapture just study Prov on the fool. Then you'll be in position to come back and join the rest of us.

Some would call studying the fool here an exercise in futility. Others may say only masochists want their toes stomped all over. Me? I just swallow hard and move gamely on.

8. Fornication and adultery. Dealt with very seriously here. This is such a huge problem for men. Especially in these internet days. There are significant portions of this book dealing with this.

2 vs I want to point out.

7/26 She has cast down many wounded; yea, many strong men have been slain by her. Along with 1 cor.6/18 the solution is to flee. Men aren't usually strong enough to fight it. Just get out like Joseph did.

And

2/19 None who go to her return again, Neither take they hold of the paths of life.

This is one of the most serious vs in the whole bible. If anyone reading this . . .

if you committed adultery while married and a christian then you are under a very serious curse. Maybe this is the reason you haven't been able to lay hold of your christian life like you want to. Or overcome like you want to.

None who go to her return again Here is the seriousness of this curse. Committed adultery and still walking with Lord? Maybe it just hasn't shown up in your life yet. If this fits anyone reading this you had better take it very seriously. You might just end up outside the kingdom.

We know that Jesus said there is no sin that can't be forgiven. The issue is one like this is under a curse. Repentance isn't so much the issue as is dealing with the curse.

9. Women - it is interesting the amount of material here on women. They are contrasted in types of wisdom and foolishness. A whole chap deals with a godly righteous women chap 31.

A bit off topic here but there is so much back and forth in the world and the church today about women. I mean Paul hated women right? (I feel stupid even repeating that) Well I'd like to say that both Paul and Jesus were sure friends with lots of them. There are whole sections of Isaiah written in the feminine. Also have you ever noticed that while man was a special creation in Gen1-2. So was the women. A completely separate creation. Something Jesus attended to personally just like the man. I think there was some time that passed before Eve even knew there was a man. All she saw was Jesus.

In light of the strong admonitions to men concerning adultery I'd like to point out one vs about women on the subject.

6/26 The adulteress will hunt for the precious life.

This vs speaks to something very deep in the heart of a women.

24

25

Let your eyes look straight ahead,

26

Ponder the path of your feet,
And let all your ways be established.

27

Do not turn to the right or the left;
Remove your foot from evil.
